Each year a small group of leadership volunteers gather on the Saturday after Thanksgiving to help light and decorate the tree, sometimes using special colored ribbons to represent different types of cancer, other times using inexpensive, handmade ornaments celebrating the theme of the Relay that particular year. We always take pride in

our local Relay events and celebrate the difference that it makes in the fight against cancer.

The park is also a great place to enjoy outdoor exercises such as running, walking, skateboarding, or just spending a special day with the kids to play on the play gym.
